





#### **Sewing Box Needs**

Fabric Scissors - Fabric Scissors are specially designed to be used on fabric. Do Not use fabric scissors on paper because it could damage the scissors and Do Not use regular scissors on fabric. Pins and Pincushion-Pins are very important to hold your fabric together, make sure you bring a pincushion to hold your pins. We don't want any pins on the ground!

Seam Rippers- No one wants to use a seam ripper but it is important to have. Everyone makes mistakes!

Thread and Bobbins- Always make sure that you have plenty of thread and bobbins, you never know when you might run out.

Measuring Tools- Sewing is very precise. Make sure you bring a measuring tape!

Machine and sewing needles- You never know when your needle might break or you need to hand sew!

#### Bean and Avocado Wrap

NOVEMBER 30, 2016 BY DINNER TONIGHT

The colors and flavors in our Bean and Avocado wrap are amazing- beans, onions, avocado, red cabbage, carrots, and cilantro. Use whole-wheat tortillas to give added fiber.

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Mash beans and avocado in medium bowl with a potato masher or fork.
- 2. Stir in cheese and onion.
- 3. In another medium bowl whisk oil, vinegar, salt, and chipotle Chile.
- 4. Add cabbage and mix together.
- 5.To assemble the wraps, spread about 1/2 cup of the bean and avocado mixture onto a tortilla and top with about 1/3 cup of the cabbage, carrots, and cilantro.
- 6. Roll up.
- 7. Repeat with remaining ingredients.

- 1 15 ounce <u>can unsalted</u> <u>beans of choice</u> drained and rinsed
- 1 ripe avocado
- 1/4 cup <u>reduced-fat</u> shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup diced red onion
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoons <u>cider</u> <u>vinegar</u>
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons <u>canned</u> <u>chipotle Chile in adobo</u> <u>sauce</u> finely chopped
- 2 cups <u>red cabbage</u> shredded
- 1 medium carrot shredded
- 1/4 cup <u>chopped fresh</u> <u>cilantro</u>
- 4 corn tortillas 7-inch

# 5 Great Reasons to Cook with Your Kids

When it comes to raising an adventurous eater, it is not just about coaxing kids to eat their <u>veggies</u>. Bringing up a child who can enjoy a cantaloupe as much as a cupcake takes patience and persistence, but it does not have to feel like a chore.

Kids may need to have frequent joyful experiences involving food to overcome the anxiety they may have around tasting the unfamiliar. Over time, cooking with your children can help build that confidence—and provide rich sensory experiences.

Here are five ways to enjoy cooking with your children while raising an adventurous eater along the way.

**Engage other senses**. For a hesitant eater, tasting an unfamiliar food can sometimes be intimidating. You can help your child explore foods when cooking using other senses besides taste. This helps to build positive associations with food.



Kneading dough, rinsing vegetables, and tearing lettuce all involve touching food and being comfortable with texture. The complex flavors we experience when eating food come from both taste sensations from the tongue AND smelling with the nose. While cooking with new ingredients, some children may feel too overwhelmed to taste. If this happens, you can try suggesting smelling a food first; this may provide a bridge to tasting in the future.

Use cooking to raise smart kids. There are so many lessons that can be taught while cooking. Math concepts like counting, measurement, and fractions naturally unfold when navigating a recipe with kids. Explaining how food changes with temperature or how certain foods can help our body be healthy provide great lessons in science. While cooking with your child, practice new vocabulary as you describe how food looks, feels, and tastes. Following a recipe from start to finish helps build the skills for planning and completing projects.

Make cooking part of the family culture. The family meal can start in the kitchen as you cook together. Family meal preparation is an opportunity to celebrate your cultural heritage by passing down recipes. Help your kids find new, seasonal recipes to add to your repertoire and family cookbook. Cooking together and prioritizing health over the convenience of processed food are great ways to lead by example and help your children buy into a culture of wellness. Building daily and seasonal traditions around cooking together helps strengthen your family's commitment to a healthy lifestyle.

Keep it safe. Teach kids the importance of staying safe while cooking by showing them how to hold kitchen tools safely, how to use oven mitts to protect hands from heat, and how to turn appliances on and off safely. Always supervise children when cooking to ensure they are sticking with safe and age-appropriate tasks. The best way to keep cooking safe is to know your child's abilities and his or her stage of development. A four-year-old child, for example, may not be ready to sauté vegetables over a hot pan, but may have the fine motor skills to rinse fruits or tear salad leaves. Keeping safety in mind, it is not difficult to get kids—even toddlers—involved in the kitchen.


Ask for input. Children feel more included in mealtime when they are asked to be a part of meal preparation. Collaborate with your kids when selecting recipes for main dishes or sides. Let them help you make the shopping list and find groceries in the store or farmers market.

When cooking together, let children offer a critique of the foods you are preparing. Together you can decide what ingredients you should add to enhance the flavor. Talk about how people enjoy different tastes, and share your preferences with each other. Letting children be "in charge" of details like how to set the table will help them feel invested in mealtime.

Over many years, cooking as a family will help develop a happy, adventurous eater with some pretty valuable life skills—and plenty of happy memories in the kitchen. With enough practice, your child will someday be able to cook YOU a delicious meal!

# HORSE JUDGING

It's time to start horse judging! 4-H'ers interested in attending Parker Co. 4-H Horse Judging practices will be administered a fill in the blank, test on basic horse knowledge at the mandatory horse judging practice informational meeting. A score of 80 is required in order to attend Parker Co. 4-H Horse Judging practices. Worry not because if you are interested in horse judging, you have plenty of time to brush up on the information below. As long as you can label parts of the horse, identify colors, list common stock horse breeds, identify common equine associations, are familiar with gaits and can provide examples of common Western/English judged events, you're good to go. Everything you need to know is down below.

#### Frequently Asked Questions...

- Why must youth pass a test to attend horse judging practices? We have one coach and many youth interested in judging. Youth need to have the basic horse knowledge in order for them to get the most out of the practices.
- If I don't pass the test, may I still compete in horse judging contests? Absolutely. If a young person does not pass the test, we can provide additional resources <u>that can be studied on their own</u> and they may compete as an individual at any of the horse judging contests open to 4-H members.
- May I invite others to attend horse judging practices after the informational? Unfortunately, no. Each
  practice builds on from the previous practice. If an individual does not attend the mandatory
  informational, they will not be able to attend the practices.
- If I'm unable to attend the practices, may I still compete in horse judging contests? Absolutely. We understand, schedules are busy and practices may not align with your schedule. 4-H'ers may still practice on their own and compete as an individual at any of the horse judging contests open to 4-H members,

# Please Read Before You Commit to a Horse

#### So You Think You Want a Horse?

\*\*\*Please Note\*\*\* I gathered these prices back in 2018 so there's a good chance they have increased.

I have had the great privilege of owning horses since I was two years old and cannot imaging my life without them. Over years as County Extension Agent for 4-H and Youth Development here in Parker County, it has come to my attention that some may have jumped the gun in getting a horse before they were ready. I've put together a basic list of things you need and things you should be prepared for.

Fact: This past week (7 days) one of my horses has cost me upwards of \$900. In 1 week!! Part of this was due to routine care, the other, an emergency vet visit. On a completely different occasion, 1 week (7 days), my horse cost me \$10,000 in medical expenses. So you think you want a horse?

In no way is this article meant to be mean or scare your but it is meant to be real. A horse owner is responsible for caring for an animal that is completely dependent on it's owner. Yes, they are beautiful majestic animals, but they are not meant for everyone.

#### Things you must have and be able to provide:

- A place to keep it -
  - Your horse will need at minimum a shelter where it can get out of the weather.
  - Horses can quickly overgraze a piece of land and leave you with nothing but a dry lot and weeds. Proper pasture rotation should be practiced to help maintain grazing.

- Trailer I can't tell you the number of people that get a horse before they get a trailer. A horse owner should never have to depend on someone else to haul their animal. There will come a time that a horse will need to be hauled in for an emergency at midnight (I promise it will happen), and when that time comes (because it will), you will need a trailer. Vets cannot treat all emergencies on a call out. I'm not saying that you have to have \$120K rig, but you do need a way that you can safely transport your horse to places, that doesn't solely rely on other people hauling the horse. Stepping off my soap box now.
- Routine Vet/Farrier Care (this is so often overlooked)
  - Yearly Vaccines ~ \$150 Includes office visit or farm call, vaccines (EWT, F/R, WNV and Rabies), and Coggins.
  - 6 Month Boosters ~ \$85 Includes office visit or farm call. F/R and WNV Vaccines
  - Yearly Teeth Float ~ \$180
  - Farrier a horse MUST have their feet trimmed every 5-6 weeks. Depending on the quality of the horse's hooves, the terrain it's exposed to, as well as the horse's job determines whether or not the horse will need shoes. A hoof trim usually runs about \$40-\$50 per trim (\$450/year). If your horse requires shoes you're looking at \$130-\$150 (\$1,350/year).
  - Worming 4-6 times/year at \$12/tube (\$72/year).


• Feed/Hay - Prices for feed and hay can vary drastically, but it is highly recommended that you provide a high quality, well balanced feed ration and hay to your horse. An average horse at maintenance will cost approximately \$160/month (\$1,920/year). Keep in mind this is an average horse at maintenance...if you are hauling to events every weekend and riding several times a week this would quickly increase.



- An average horse that requires shoes will cost you approximately \$3,745/year
- An average horse that does not require shoes will cost you approximately \$2,845/year
- It is highly recommended to have a pre-purchase exam performed by veterinarian to make sure the horse doesn't have any pre-existing soundness issues. These exams typically run between \$800-\$1,500. Yes, it's quite a bit of money, but so is the maintenance on a horse that is navicular or has arthritis.
- I am not opposed to getting a horse from a rescue, however some rescue organizations are not what they say they are.
  - a. Please do your research on the organization.
  - b. Know that there are some rescue horses that come with baggage. Whether that be health issues or behavior issues. If you're a first time, inexperienced horse owner, I would not recommend taking on something that requires a lot of maintenance or one that could potentially be a safety risk.
- Be very cautious of these "kill pen" rescue groups/auctions. They like to pull at our heart strings using terms like "kill pen", "final days", and "slaughter" and the intentions aren't always honorable. Horses that come from these places can have very severe health issues like pneumonia because they have been packed in a trailer and hauled long distances. Again, just operate with caution.

#### Final Words/Thoughts

Do not rush the process of selecting and purchasing a horse. The horse industry has exploded and horses are extremely expensive. DO NOT settle, especially if you are new to horses. If you don't have the money to purchase the one that really fits you, save up. Remember these are 900-1000 + pound animals. When you climb up on it, you don't want to be wondering what it's going to do. Parents, you are putting your child on a very powerful animal, make sure you take the time an seek out quidance from someone experienced with horses (not the person you're buying the horse from) and get their opinion.

# MAJOR STOCK SHOW TAG ORDERS (LATE) – HEIFERS

2024 Major Stock Show Heifer Tag Orders - Due October 9, 2023 (click link below to order)

- \*\*NEW\*\* FOR 2023 heifers will be charged \$25 (We, Parker Co., charge an additional \$3 to cover the online payment system, postage and validation supplies) per validation fee. This increase in cost is due to two factors we are facing this year. 1) In an effort to be in compliance with Texas Animal Health Commission, we are switching our previous EID frequency tags to 840 frequency EID tags. This will allow our state validated livestock to move in compliance with TAHC across state lines and be in compliance when issues a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health papers). This is a move in a positive direction, but does come at an increased cost. 2) Costs and fees have increased across the board, as well as expanding the services of the validation program to additional shows. That said, we must compensate accordingly to continue to provide educators, exhibitors, and their families the continued support, education, and consistency we have established. Please keep in mind the validation fee is not ONLY for the cost of the tag, but the entire validation SYSTEM that includes personnel, travel to livestock shows, a robust online database/maintenance, and our validation compliance team that helps ensure our rules and guidelines are enforced to ensure a fair and level playing field for Texas livestock exhibitors.
- \*\*NEW\*\* FOR 2023 all state validated heifers will be tagged similar to steers. This will bring our heifer validation program in line with breeding sheep, breeding goats, and breeding gilts.
- Heifers that are already validated and have not changed breed or ownership, do not need to be revalidated with a tag. Only newly validated heifers will get a tag and will be charged the new validation fee. As always, if a heifer changes ownership or breed, they must be revalidated.
- NOTE: Once validated, heifers remain eligible through their show career unless they change breed or ownership. There is no need to re-validate a heifer if breed or ownership is not being changed.
- 23-24 Registered Breeding Heifers 1 exhibitor per animal, color copy of papers required. \*\*\*Heifers
   will now be tagged\*\*\*



# MAJOR STOCK SHOW TAG ORDERS (LATE) – SHEEP-GOATS

#### 2024 - Major Stock Show Lamb and Goat Tag Orders-

#### Due October 9, 2023 (click link below to order)

- \*NEW FOR 2023\* Lambs and goats validated during the 2023 State Fair Validation Period WILL BE ELIGIBLE for 2024 Spring Major Shows. Market animals validated for the 2023 State Fair will carryover for 2024 Spring Major Shows. Once validated, the project MUST stay in the care of the exhibitor that project is validated to; if the exhibitor chooses to sell the project to a new exhibitor, the new exhibitor MUST REVALIDATE the project within the next validation period.
- Market Lamb May be validated by family (validation will carry over to 2024 spring majors)
- Market Goats May be validated by family (validation will carry over to 2024 spring majors)
- Wether Dams May be validated by family validation good for 3 years unless change of ownership.
- Wether Does May be validated by family validation good for 3 years unless change of ownership.
- Registered Breeding Sheep \*\*\*may be family validated if all exhibitors are listed on papers\*\*\*,
   <u>color copy of papers required at time of validation</u> validation good for 3 years unless change of ownership. Ownership deadline October 1, 2023.
- Registered Breeding Boer Goats \*\*\*may be family validated all exhibitors must be listed on papers\*\*\* **color copy of papers required at time of validation** validation good for 3 years unless a change of ownership. Ownership deadline October 1, 2023

\*\*\*TLBA and TGBA Tags must be in the sheep and goats ears at time of validation for them to be recorded.

\*\*\*TLBA and TGBA tags are required for sheep and goats at the San Angelo Stock Show.

\*\*\*Please note, all sheep and goat tags (market and breeding) are interchangeable. If you ordered a market lamb tag but got a breeding goat instead you may use it to tag the breeding goat.

\*\*\* Registered Breeding Sheep and Goats - a hard color copy of the registration papers are required to be submitted at time of validation. Please do not email or text.



# SHOWING LIVESTOCK

We are kicking off the new 4-H year and I wanted to offer some words of wisdom to you all in regards to your livestock projects...

If you are wanting to show livestock because you want to start a scholarship fund for school...invest the \$ that you would spend on livestock and showing and you'll come out with way more.

Showing livestock is **NOT** about making \$. The average county show check that we receive is \$2,000. To put that into perspective you're spending at least \$1,000 to purchase any hooved livestock project and that does not include the cost of feed and supplies. We consider it a good day if you break even.

Showing livestock is about the lessons learned, the knowledge and responsibility gained, and the time spent in the barn with friends and family.

I've seen a lot over my 15 years in Extension and one common theme that arises every year is a 4-H'er biting off more than they can chew when it comes to a livestock project. If you are new to 4-H or are an existing 4-H member that wants to dabble in a new project area please keep the following in mind:

- Start with the county livestock show Individuals new to livestock should always start with getting their feet wet at the county livestock show. Major stock shows are a completely different animal and can make for a pretty terrible experience if you don't know the ropes or how to navigate them. They're also extremely expensive and one wrong move at that level can make all of your hard work go down the drain.
- You are the one making the decision to take on a new project, it is your responsibility - I can provide you with educational resources and can refer you to volunteers that can help on occasion, but this project is YOUR responsibility.

- Do you have a way to transport the animal No matter the species, there will be a time that you will need to transport your animal. Do you have a reliable way of getting your animal where it needs to be especially in an emergency situation. If the answer is no, don't get that project.
- Do you have the proper facilities to house the project show animals are cared for differently than commercial animals. You need to have access to the proper facilities.
- Can you afford the project Let's just be real...showing is expensive, no matter the species. The cost associated with a project, isn't just the purchase price of the project. You'll need to purchase show supplies, feed, and heath care items. Even if you have a scramble certificate, it is very hard to find a show quality animal for that certificate amount these days.
- Do you have a mentor that could help you in your **project area** - yes we do have volunteer leaders that are happy to help when they can, but you also need to be real with your expectations. These are VOLUNTEER leaders and there is no way they can tell you everything they know at a Saturday clinic. They also have their own projects they are caring for. An involved breeder is the way to go. No one knows their animals better and your success in the show ring reflects positively on them.

- Do your research before you buy- there are a lot of niche breeds that are not suitable for livestock shows as well as timelines that must be followed. There's nothing more frustrating than telling someone the animal they've purchased is not eligible for show. Make sure you are familiar with the rules and quidelines of the show before you purchase an animal.

# LIVESTOCK PROJECT COSTS

#### GETTING REAL WITH THE PRICE OF SHOW ANIMALS THESE DAYS

A recent conversation with a family new to 4-H and livestock projects sent me on a journey to find costs of show animals and what you should be prepared to pay if you want to participate. A couple of points that need to be made, first and foremost...

- Livestock projects are not cheap...
- The purchase of the show animal is most often times the least expensive part of the project, and again, livestock projects are not cheap...
- The Livestock Show Industry and the Commercial Livestock Industry are not the same. The quicker you come to terms with that, the more you'll understand the price points of the livestock show industry. Yet again, livestock projects (commercial or show) are not cheap...
- Yes, there is always a chance of finding a breeder that is willing to help a young person get started, but as mentioned before, the purchase of the show animal is often times the least expensive part of the project. Investments still must be made in housing, feed, supplies, health care and entry fees.
- What is your goal? As with anything, the higher the quality of animal, the more expensive it's going to be.
- Lastly, nowhere does it say that you have to raise a show animal for a 4-H livestock project.
  - Raise an animal project to put in your freezer.
  - Raise an animal to take to the sale barn. You at least stand a chance of making a return on your investment. You need to do a little market research to make sure you're choosing the best species and breed within that species.
  - I had a 4-H'er that created a pretty good little breeding Boer Goat business. They weren't show quality animals, but he saw a local demand for small acreage land owners wanting Boer Goats. He raised them, sold the females, took the males to the sale barn and was able to pay for his own truck and many other things with his efforts.
- No matter what direction you decide (show, commercial, or your freezer), it's worth the investment. The knowledge, responsibility and character youth gain from raising livestock is second to none.

# THIS IS A LITTLE HARDER TO ANSWER BUT I GAVE IT A SHOT

I reached out to different breeders and people in the show industry to ask what bottom dollar in the livestock show industry would be, and below are the amounts I received.

Yes, you might very well be able to find something cheaper than what's listed below but at least you can have a general idea of the price points of these projects. *Please keep in mind, I asked about bottom dollar, most of these prices reflect lower quality animals.* 

- Rabbits Easily spend anywhere from \$25/rabbit up to \$150/rabbit.
- Goats If you're looking for a show goat you need to be prepared to pay at least \$500, and really and truly they're going to be closer to the \$700-\$1,000 for that lower-middle of the road, show quality animal. Goats do tend to run higher than sheep.
- Sheep you need to be ready to pay at least \$500 for an animal with a little show quality and again closer to \$700-\$1,000 for that lower-middle of the road, show quality animal.
- Swine I was told that it is very difficult to find a lower end show quality hog for less than \$500. Also keep in mind, swine feed is one of the most expensive livestock feed on the shelf.
- Beef You should be ready to spend at least \$2,500-\$3,500 for a heifer or a steer.
- Market Poultry Broilers are going to be anywhere from \$1.50-\$2.00, Turkeys \$6-\$7. You need to factor in the number of birds you have/need to buy. Poultry feed is also very expensive and market birds eat a tremendous amount of feed.

I hope this gives you a better idea of the lower end price points of livestock projects. Also, please understand, most breeders are all about supporting youth but they also have to make a living and cover their costs as well. It's the nature of the beast.
