

TEXAS EXTENSION EDUCATION ASSOCIATION 4-H SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Texas Home Demonstration Association was organized in August, 1926 by 399 women attending a Farmer's Short course at A&M University. One of the purposes for organizing was to establish a scholarship for a deserving 4-H girl. This original scholarship of \$200 has grown to 12 in 2002, given annually at \$1000 each (\$500 Fall; \$500 Spring); however, in 1997, only four \$100 scholarships were given due to lack of funds. Funding of these scholarships began with a 5 cent donation per member in1926. Scholarships are now funded through the annual TEEA budget and awarded to a 4-H boy or girl, one per District. The twelve \$1500 TEEA State scholarships are open to any qualifying 4-H'er in the respective District where the youth lives, regardless of there being a TEEA or no TEEA in the county.

The following is due to the Parker Co. Extension office by 5PM February 15, 2024...

- Envelope labeled with the applicant's name and county.
- Only a black and white copy of Texas 4-H Recordbook from the previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline of August 31 accepted.
- Official high school transcript with ACT and/or SAT scores included.
- Completed TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application.
- Two letters of recommendation: one from a county Extension agent or 4-H club manager and one from a teacher, employer, or community leader (not a relative).



Placing: 1-4-3-2 Cuts: 4-3-4

I placed this class of Earbuds 1 4 3 2

Finding an obvious top in the Linklike Headphones they were the only option that met all of Camille's criteria and were reasonably priced.

In a close top pair of 1 over 4. The Linklink Headphones:

- · retains the advantage in noise canceling technology and 4 leaves us questioning whether that technology is offered
- · 1 also has the highest consumer rating
- · And a longer battery life
- Though a budget is not mentioned, the Linklink headphones come in at a much lower price.

I will admit the Optoma NuForce seem to have a lot of bells and whistles when it comes to sport headphones but again they leave the consumer questioning whether the noise canceling technology is offered.

In my middle pair I placed 4 over 3. The Optoma NuForce:

· Offers a microphone, a longer battery life, a higher consumer rating and comes in at a much more affordable price than the Bose Ear buds.

Due to the differences in the pair I find no obvious grants.

In my final pair I placed 3 over 2. The Bose Sound Sport Ear buds

- · Are clearly designed for active sports more so than the Beats Solo 3
- · They're sweat resistant, light weight and have a more affordable price point

Not one set of earbuds can touch the battery life of the Beats Solo 3 but they will remain bottom due to design.

· This pair of headphones is not the best choice for running. They're large, not waterproof and the most expensive option.

Event Information

Texas 4-H Dog Show will be held on July 11-13, 2024 at the Walker County Fairgrounds in Huntsville, Texas. To be eligible for this show, dogs must be validated by January 10, 2024 in 4-H Online. Attached are detailed written instructions. Video instructions are also available at https://youtu.be/3NzoljK9Pco if that is more convenient. 2024 Texas 4-H Dog Show Rule Book is also attached and will be posted https://texas4-h.tamu.edu/projects/dog-care-training/ soon.

There will be a couple of opportunities to practice with your dog whether you validated or not.

- Montgomery County 4-H Dog Show will be February 3, 2024 at the Montgomery County Fairgrounds in Conroe, Texas
- Brazos County 4-H Dog Show is normally a couple of weeks later
- Tarrant County 4-H Dog Show has been in April
- Wise County is has historically been done in June.

We will send details of each of these as soon as we have them. If your county is planning to host a dog show, please let us know so we can help you publicize it.

As 4-H members complete their validation, here are some things to keep in mind: For purebred dogs (they do not have to be registered, just look purebred) you will select the correct Group and list the breed.

For mixed breed dogs you will select the Weight Group of the dog and list the dominant breed along with the word "Mix" or list the two breeds if known. (Example: Border Collie Mix or Mastiff/Great Dane.)

Photos of the left and right side of the dog should be a side view of the whole dog. Get on the dog's level so they do not turn into top views. They should also be clear and light enough we can see all markings and color of the dog. The dog should only be wearing a collar. No sweaters, costumes, rain gear or anything that covers the dog's color and markings.

Dogs MUST be validated each year. If you validated a dog last year, the information and photos will be in the system, but you must still review and SUBMIT to validate for the 2023-2024 4-H year. Please update the photos if the dog has changed significantly since last year.

We do encourage you to validate any dogs that you are eligible to show. Situations may change through the year.





- . The Canine Good Citizen testing is a non-competitive opportunity for exhibitors to demonstrate their dog's basic good manners and earn the Canine Good Citizenship certificate through AKC. Started in 1989, the CGC Program is designed to reward dogs who have good manners at home and in the community. The CGC Program is a program that stresses responsible pet ownership for owners and basic good manners for dogs. All dogs who pass the 10-step CGC test may receive a certificate from the American Kennel Club. Testing is subject to certified judge availability.
- The 10 Steps are...
 - 1. Accepting a friendly stranger
 - 2. Sitting politely for petting
 - 3. Appearance and grooming
 - Out for a walk (walking on a loose lead)
 - 5. Walking through a crowd
 - Sit and sown on command and staying in place
 - 7. Coming when called
 - 8. Reaction to another dog
 - 9. Reaction to distraction
 - 10. Supervised separation

JUNIOR/INTERMEDIATE CONSTRUCTION CATEGORIES

- 1. **Everyday Living** Includes casual sportswear, weekend-wear, clothing for school, casual after-school events, or hanging out with friends.
- 2. Refashion The result of modifying existing clothing into something more fashionable. The main purpose of Refashion is creativity, as well as sewing skills. The member designs and sews a wearable garment from previously used garments. The completed garment is different from its original use, not just an alteration. (For example, neckties sewn together to form a skirt or taking old t-shirts and making them into a skirt).
- 3. **Dressy to Formal** Garments worn to dressy activities such as church, banquets, luncheons and 4-H interviews. Examples are children's suits and dressy dresses. Original material must be fabric and not from recycled items.
- 4. **Special Interest** Limited to special purpose garments. Examples are band, pep squad and cheerleader uniforms; sleep wear; theatrical and circus-type costumes such as clown suits and ballet costumes; equestrian clothing and riding apparel; hiking clothing; or rock-climbing clothing. Garments in this category should not be suitable for ordinary activities.

JUNIOR/INTERMEDIATE CONSTRUCTION GUIDELINES

- All garments must have been constructed during participation in a 4-H Clothing
 Project between June 2023 and the date of the District contest. Garments may be
 constructed by sewing, knitting, or crocheting using new or recycled material.
 Accessories such as belts, shoes, hosiery, gloves, jewelry, and hats may be
 purchased. Items not constructed by the participant will be considered accessories.
- 2. All garments worn may be entered. However, if a t-shirt needs to be worn underneath something then only the constructed garment would be judged. No additional garments may be carried with the exception of props (show stick, tennis racket, golf club, corsage, teddy bear, etc...)

JUNIOR/INTERMEDIATE BUYING CATEGORIES

- 1. **Everyday Living** Includes casual sportswear, weekend-wear, clothing for school, casual after-school events, or hanging out with friends.
- 2. Fantastic Fashion Under \$25 The \$25 challenge category is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to include different shopping venues.
 Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, Goodwill, Salvation Army, or retail store.
- 3. **Semi-Formal** Entry must be designed for semi-formal to dressy occasions and made from fabrics intended for the same. This includes men's suits and women's dressy attire. Ensembles may be worn to activities such as concerts, banquets, and other nice events generally not worn during the Monday through Friday week.
- 4. **Special Interest** Entry should be a specific outfit that you NEED to know how to purchase wisely. Entry should be something that reflects a special interest of the participant, such as equestrian clothing and riding apparel, dance costumes, hiking clothing, or rock climbing clothing.

JUNIOR/INTERMEDIATE BUYING GUIDELINES

- 1. All garments worn must have been purchased during participation in the 4-H Clothing Project between June 2022 and the date of the District Contest. If during comparison shopping, the 4-H member determines that paying a professional seamstress (at normal retail cost) to construct an ensemble is the best choice for purchasing a garment, he or she must list the cost of fabrics, patterns, notions, any other supplies and payment to the seamstress as the cost of the garment. Enter the appropriate information in the column headed "Garments Selected" on the Buying Division Worksheet. Information will be evaluated during judging so the worksheet must be complete. Adult judges will ask questions about the garment and the comparison shopping experience.
- 2. Comparison shopping may include department store, boutiques or specialty stores, mail order catalogs, internet sites, outlet stores, and professional seamstresses.

 Three different shopping sources must be used, not three sections of a single store.
- 3. All garments worn (garments that are visible-i.e., blouse under jacket or vest) during the interview process must be included in the buying worksheet.
- 4.The Junior Buying Division Worksheet must be completed. This is a simple one-page worksheet.

SENIOR CONSTRUCTION CATEGORIES

- 1. **Everyday Living** Includes casual sportswear, weekend-wear, sleepwear, clothing for school, casual after- school events, or hanging out with friends.
- 2. **ReFashion** The result of modifying existing clothing or fabric item (such as tablecloth or curtain) into something more fashionable. The main purpose of ReFashion is creativity, as well as sewing skills. The member designs and sews a wearable garment from previously used garments or fabric item. The completed garment is different from its original use, not just an alteration. (Examples: neck ties sewn together to form a skirt or taking old t-shirts and making them into a skirt).
- 3. **Semi-Formal to Formal** Entry must be designed for semi-formal to formal occasions and made from fabrics intended for the same.
 - Semi-formal is a little less formal than formal black tie.
 - Women - includes midi dresses, maxi-dresses, wrap dresses, cocktail dresses, pantsuits, and jumpsuits
 - Men - includes slacks and a blazer, a two-piece suit (with or without a tie), accessories that show personal style (pocket squares, dress watch, custom shoes)
 - Formal prom, evening wedding or gala party
 - Women - typically floor-length gown, a knee-length cocktail dress or classic little black dress.
 - Men - two or three-piece suit or tuxedo, with a shirt and tie.
- 4. **Theatre/Costume** Garment intended for use as a costume, which would include stage production. May be sewn from fabric or from another garment. These garments may be unusual or innovative materials; imaginative but wearable.



NUTS

All nuts are about equal in terms of calories per ounce, and in moderation, are all healthy additions to any diet. "Their mix of omega-3 fatty acids, protein, and fiber will help you feel full and suppress your appetite," says Judy Caplan, RD, a spokesperson for the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.

Almonds, Cashews, Pistachios

Cold Weather Feeding Practices for Horses

<u> January 2020 E - Extension - Horses</u>

As the temperatures begin to fall in the early winter months, horses require additional energy to stay warm. This additional energy requirement usually calls for changes or alterations in feeding practices. This article explains how cold weather can impact your horse and what you can do to make your winter feeding program more efficient.

The Impact of Cold Weather

During cold weather, the horse requires additional energy to maintain its internal body temperature and keep warm. The exact amount of energy depends on the severity and extent of the cold period. In the Carolinas, horses typically experience a dramatic drop in temperature for one to three days, followed by a return to moderate, normal temperatures. When environmental temperatures, including wind chill, drop below 45 degrees F (the critical temperature), significant amounts of energy are used by the horse to maintain its internal body heat. The amount of energy required by the horse to meet daily energy needs is measured as digestible energy (DE) in calories. The critical temperature can be used to estimate increased energy needs which the horse must obtain from its diet. For each 1 degree F decrease below the critical temperature, the horse requires a 1 percent increase in digestible energy to maintain a consistent body temperature.

Wind chill, moisture and coat thickness will affect the critical temperature. The horse's thick winter coat has an insulating effect against cold and wind. If the coat becomes wet, the critical temperature will increase by 10 to 15 degree F. The following formula is used to calculate the increased DE requirement for a horse as a result of cold temperatures and wet, windy conditions: critical temperature – actual temperature = percent increase in DE required.

Adjusting Energy Intake:

An Example: The following example clarifies how to adjust energy intake for a dry environmental temperature of 30 degrees F with a wind chill that results in an actual temperature of 25 degrees F. The example applies to a 1,100-pound horse at maintenance.

- Step 1. Subtract the actual temperature, including the wind-chill adjustment, from the critical temperature, accounting for wet conditions if necessary: 45 degrees F 25 degrees F = 20 percent increase in DE requirements.
- Step 2. Because a 1,100-pound horse at maintenance requires 16.4 Mcal of DE per day (see AG-558-1) and because the horse in this example requires a 20 percent increase in DE, you multiply as follows: 16.4 Mcal x 20 percent = +3.28 Mcal increase. The requirement thus increases as follows: 16.4 Mcal + 3.28 Mcal = 19.68 Mcal DE/day.
- Step 3. Next, you need to determine the amount of feed necessary to supply these increased calories. A 1,100-pound horse typically consumes 19 pounds of ration daily, or 1.7 percent of its body weight. Because the recommended DE level of the ration (concentrate mix plus forage) fed to a horse at maintenance is .90 Mcal DE/pound of feed, we can calculate the increase in feed as follows: 3.28 Mcal ÷ .90 Mcal = 3.64 pounds of additional feed to provide 19.68 Mcal DE/ day.
- Step 4. Determine the total amount of feed the horse requires by adding the 3.64 pounds of additional feed to the 19 pounds of feed the horse requires under normal conditions: 19.0 + 3.64 = 22.64 pounds per day of total ration.

The Importance of Hay and Fat

Feedstuffs vary in the amount of internal heat produced when digested by the horse. Forages, which are digested by microbes located in the cecum and large intestine, produce more heat than concentrate mixes, which are digested by enzymes in the small intestine. Although concentrates contain more total DE per pound than hay, the amount of actual heat given off by the digestion process is significantly less. Thus, the best way to increase internal body heat while maintaining a safer, more consistent energy intake is to increase the intake of hay. A horse should consume at least 1.5 to 1.75 percent of its body weight as hay during cold periods. Thus, a 1,000-pound mature horse should consume 15 to 17.5 pounds of hay daily to meet critical temperature needs during cold weather. During prolonged periods of cold temperature — several days below the critical temperature – both the concentrate and forage portion of the diets should be increased in equal proportions. The energy density of the concentrate mix can be increased by adding fat in the form of 4 to 8 ounces of a vegetable oil per day, or by the addition of a commercial fat supplement according to label recommendations. Feeding of additional amounts of concentrate or increasing the energy density of the concentrate is especially important if the horse is in poor body condition with low body fat, or is a "hard keeper." The extra body fat provides an additional insulating effect against wind and also serves as an energy reserve that can be used when the horse is fed an energy-deficient diet.

The Importance of Water

Maintaining ample water intake is the most critical part of ensuring the health of your horse during cold weather. The horse prefers a water temperature of 45 to 65 degrees F. Under normal conditions, the horse will consume 1 gallon of water per 100 pounds of body weight. A 1,100-pound horse will consume 10 to 12 gallons of water daily. As the water temperature decreases, the horse will consume less water. The same 1,100-pound horse may consume as little as 1 to 3 gallons of water daily when water temperature is 32 degrees F.





Low water intake is directly related to the increased incidence of impaction colic. Water intake can be encouraged by increasing the amount of forage being fed prior to a drop in temperature. The resulting increase of dry matter encourages the horse to drink more water.

Concentrate mashes should be fed during the actual cold period when water temperature is below 45 degrees F.

Feeding 2 to 3 gallons of hot water daily mixed into a mash with a textured or pelleted concentrate mix will provide additional water intake. To avoid gas colic, allow the mash to sit for 15 minutes; this will permit the feed to expand prior to feeding. If possible, offer 10 gallons of water, at 65 degrees F or warmer, twice daily. Break and remove ice from water tubs, making certain to provide water that is available free-choice.

Steps to Effective Cold-Weather Management

- Monitor weather forecasts to determine cold periods in advance.
- Increase the dry-matter content of the diet 24 hours prior to forecasted cold conditions.
- Strive to keep your horse in good body condition prior to winter months.
- Determine your horse's critical temperature and adjust DE intake accordingly.
- Increase hay intake to horses in good body condition and "easy keepers."
- Increase forage and concentrate intake for horses in poor condition and "hard keepers."
- Supplement fat to increase the energy density of concentrates.
- Feed the same concentrate as a moist mash during cold periods.
- Offer 10 gallons of warmed water daily.



What is Nuclear Engineering?

Nuclear engineering is a multidisciplinary field that goes beyond providing nuclear power for electrical production. Nuclear technology touches our lives in many ways and nuclear engineers solve everyday problems and contribute to our health and safety. Nuclear engineers may apply radiation in disease treatment and food supplies, operate nuclear energy systems, develop regulations to ensure safety, or facilitate space exploration. Becoming a nuclear engineer gives you the opportunity to help mold the future in exciting new ways. Many nuclear engineering graduates work for electric power companies that use nuclear power plants or help service and maintain these plants. Other graduates go on to work in industries that use radioactivity or radiation, such as medicine, food, and agriculture. These fields need nuclear engineers to detect problems, monitor processes, and protect the public. The federal government also hires nuclear engineers to design next generation reactors for submarines, aircraft carriers, and space probes; regulate nuclear power or radiation uses; and develop advanced technologies that will be used in future power plants. Some of the industries where nuclear engineers may work are: Energy,

Medicine, Agriculture, and Space!
