A Word from Kayla

An oldie, but still very relevant...

Yep, I'm going to say it... a 4 year university isn't for everyone, and that's totally okay.

Dating myself just a bit for this one..

I received my acceptance letter from Texas A&M University early December 2000. Back in the early 2000's, we actually had to wait for an envelope to be delivered in the mail! I graduated from Sweetwater High School in Sweetwater, Texas May of 2001 (18th out of 127), headed to College Station to begin my education at Texas A&M University August 2001, and by golly I was GOING to be a veterinarian.

I was the first person in my immediate family to attend a major university. My parents did not have the money to pay for me to attend A&M and I had received maybe \$2K in scholarships, so I did have to take out student loans. I graduated with a MAg from A&M with \$22K in student loans, considering that was over 6.5 years, I fared pretty well compared to students these days. Mind you I did work 18-25 hours a week to help pay my expenses.

College ate my lunch! I was smart in high school, took all the AP and duel credit classes offered at that time, news flash, no matter how smart you are in high school, college is a completely different animal, and there are a lot of smart people at A&M. I was pretty close to transferring to Tarleton after my first semester but my best friend and roommate talked me out of it. I quickly realized that I would not have the grades for vet school, ended up changing my major 3 times (extending my time an extra semester), and graduated with a 2.7 undergrad. I had absolutely no clue what I wanted to do with my life my final semester of undergrad. I did have a good paying job, so I figured what the heck? Let's try grad school. Yes, obviously, if you want to pursue a career that requires a 4 year degree, your options are to get a 4 year degree.

When I graduated from high school, the mindset was that you "had" to get a 4 year degree to become a successful and contributing member of society. I will stand toe to toe with anyone that still has that mindset and gladly show them that is not the case. If you want to get a 4 year degree, AWESOME! If you want to go to truck driving school, AWESOME! If you want to apprentice under someone to learn a skill, AWESOME! If you want to go to cosmetology school, AWESOME! If you want to go to auctioneer school, AWESOME! If you want to become a personal trainer, AWESOME! If you want to go to any kind of trade school, AWESOME! If you want to join the military, AWESOME! You will have my support as long as you are continuing to learn in some form or fashion.

College was not for my husband. If we put all of the classes that he actually passed, together, he might have what equates to an associates degree. Mind you, a lot of money was spent on classes he did not pass. Adam is mechanically minded and likes to be a leader. Once he realized that, the sky became the limit. He is the provider for our family. The salary and benefits that I have with 2 degrees (2 degrees were required for my job, at the time I applied), doesn't come close to matching the salary and benefits he has without a degree.

I'll put it in print one more time...a 4 year university isn't for everyone, and that my friends, it totally okay.

WHO CAN JOIN?

Membership is open to all youth entering at least 9th grade regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, national origin or disability. Ambassadorship is a 12-month commitment, beginning June 2023 to May 2024.



WHEN IS TRAINING?

During the summer, ambassadors will attend a state-wide "Building Healthy Youth to Build a Healthy Texas"

Summit. This Summit will lay the foundation for ambassadors to implement health, wellness, nutrition, and safety programs across the state.



WHERE WILL YOU SERVE?

Once training is complete, youth ambassadors will provide 40 hours of service to their community. Hours can be earned through peer-to-peer education, school programs, community programs, and service learning opportunities.

This program is designed for high school age youth who have a passion for health and wellness. Youth will be trained at the local & regional level to become youth health experts who can motivate others to make changes in their lifestyle and improve overall health. 1 24-25 **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors must meet certain requirements to be considered for selection as an Ambassador. The requirements are as follows:

- Be in at least the 9th grade at beginning of the 2024-2025 school year
- Submit completed application online by April 1, 2024
- Applicants do not have to be a current member of Texas 4-H, but must agree to become a 4-H member
 (\$25 annual membership fee due September 1, 2024) if selected to participate in the HTYA program

1 24-25 MEMBER REQUIREMENTS

Those selected as a *Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador* must fulfill the following obligations. Failure to do so may result in dismissal from the program.

- Attend the statewide Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador Summit. All fees related to this training will be the responsibility of the Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador and/or county program.
- Must be a member in good standing with any other state ambassador programs where membership is held.
- Complete and report 40 hours of leadership, program efforts, or community service annually.
- Attend required continuing education trainings offered face-to-face and/or online.
- Ambassadorship is a 12-month commitment, beginning in June. Ambassadors who fulfill the minimum (40) hours of service will be invited to reapply for the following year.
- Organize at least one community health event during the year with the local Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador team and County Extension Agent.

■ 24-25 ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors must make every effort possible to attend all activities and meetings. If attendance is not possible, notice must be given to the County Extension Agent in charge, in advance, at which time agent(s) will determine if it is an excused absence.

■ 24-25 STATEWIDE SUMMIT

Attendance at the *Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador* summit **is not** optional. *No virtual or alternative options offered.*


State-wide Summit | June 2-3, 2024 | College Station, TX

TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS:

Baccalaureate:

Awarded to students who wish to pursue a Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts degree from an accredited Texas College or University.

Collegiate:

Designated for former Texas 4-H members who have been graduated from high school for at least one year, at time of awarding, and have completed a minimum of 30 hours of college credit at a grade point average of at least a 2.7.

Courageous Heart:

Awarded to Texas 4-H members that are pursuing either a Baccalaureate or Technical degree and have had to overcome an extreme obstacle while staying active in both 4-H and school.

Technical:

Awarded to students who wish to pursue technical certification in a recognized and approved major or course of study.

COMPLETED FAFSA REQUIRED TO APPLY

You must complete your FAFSA (The Free Application for Federal Student Aid) before submitting your scholarship application at http://www.fafsa.gov/. This is required for Baccalaureate, Technical, and Courageous Heart scholarships. Please complete this before mid-December.

If you wait, you may not have time to get the FAFSA paperwork submitted and receive the SAR report before the Texas 4-H Opportunity Scholarship application deadline. This is a required document to be attached to your application, without this you will not be able to apply.

TEXAS EXTENSION EDUCATION 4-H SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

TEXAS EXTENSION EDUCATION ASSOCIATION 4-H SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Texas Home Demonstration Association was organized in August, 1926 by 399 women attending a Farmer's Short course at A&M University. One of the purposes for organizing was to establish a scholarship for a deserving 4-H girl. This original scholarship of \$200 has grown to 12 in 2002, given annually at \$1000 each (\$500 Fall; \$500 Spring); however, in 1997, only four \$100 scholarships were given due to lack of funds. Funding of these scholarships began with a 5 cent donation per member in1926. Scholarships are now funded through the annual TEEA budget and awarded to a 4-H boy or girl, one per District. The twelve \$1500 TEEA State scholarships are open to any qualifying 4-H'er in the respective District where the youth lives, regardless of there being a TEEA or no TEEA in the county.

SCHOLARSHIP SUBMISSION PROCESS

The following is due to the Parker Co. Extension office by 5PM February 15, 2024...

- Envelope labeled with the applicant's name and county.
- Only a black and white copy of Texas 4-H Recordbook from the previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline of August 31 accepted.
- Official high school transcript with ACT and/or SAT scores included.
- Completed TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application.
- Two letters of recommendation: one from a county Extension agent or 4-H club manager and one from a teacher, employer, or community leader (not a relative).

- . The Canine Good Citizen testing is a non-competitive opportunity for exhibitors to demonstrate their dog's basic good manners and earn the Canine Good Citizenship certificate through AKC. Started in 1989, the CGC Program is designed to reward dogs who have good manners at home and in the community. The CGC Program is a program that stresses responsible pet ownership for owners and basic good manners for dogs. All dogs who pass the 10-step CGC test may receive a certificate from the American Kennel Club. Testing is subject to certified judge availability.
- The 10 Steps are...
 - 1. Accepting a friendly stranger
 - 2. Sitting politely for petting
 - 3. Appearance and grooming
 - Out for a walk (walking on a loose lead)
 - 5. Walking through a crowd
 - Sit and sown on command and staying in place
 - 7. Coming when called
 - 8. Reaction to another dog
 - 9. Reaction to distraction
 - 10. Supervised separation

What is a quick bread?

How does it rise?

Uses baking soda or baking powder, combined with an acid to make bread rise.

Tips for Making Quick Bread

- Heat oven to proper temperature before mixing batter.
- Mix dry ingredients well to distribute leavening agent.
- Do not mix wet ingredients with dry ingredients until ready to go in the oven. The rise reaction happens as soon as they mix.
- Mix thoroughly by do not over mix.

Honey Whole Wheat Quick Bread

JANUARY 17, 2024 BY DINNER TONIGHT

Do you want fresh bread but are in a time crunch or overwhelmed at the thought of using yeast? This Honey Whole Wheat Quick Bread recipe can be ready in about an hour and is a delicious, fiber-packed addition to your meal!

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 2. Spray a 9" x 5" loaf pan with non-stick spray.
- 3.In a large mixing bowl, whisk together whole wheat flour, all-purpose flour, flax seeds, baking soda and salt. Set it aside.
- 4.In a medium bowl, whisk together buttermilk, honey, and oil.
- 5. When oven is preheated, Combine the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients and mix only until combined with a wooden spoon. Do not overmix.
- 6. Place batter into prepared loaf pan. Smooth the top of the batter.
- 7. Sprinkle the slivered almonds and chia seeds on top, and gently push down into the dough to get them to stick.
- 8. Bake for 55 minutes or until done.
- 9. Remove from the oven and let cool on wire rack for about 10 minutes before removing bread from the pan. Cool completely before slicing. Slice less than one half inch to get 14 slices.



Breed Spotlight: Flemish Giants

The Flemish Giant rabbit is the largest breed of domestic rabbit. Flemish Giants are historically a utility breed used for their fur and meat. They are often kept as pets as they are known for being docile and patient when being handled. Believed to have originated in Flanders, Belgium, the Flemish Giant was bred as early as the 16th Century. The docile personality of the Flemish Giant has earned it the nickname "Gentle Giant", and its varied use as pet, show, breeding, meat, and fur have made it a universal rabbit. - The Flemish Giant, often tip the scales at over 20 lbs.



Market Rabbit:

Why should you eat rabbit meat? You could just eat chicken, beef, or pork. Rabbit meat is protein-packed, lean, and low in cholesterol. You can even use it as a replacement for chicken in any recipe. Aside from the health benefits of rabbit, they are one of the most efficient animals to produce. They take up very little space and can be processed once they reach 10-12 weeks of age. Rabbits have a high feed conversion ratio of about 2-3:1, meaning that for every 2-3 lbs of feed they ingest, they will produce 1 lbs of meat. Overall, rabbit meat is one of the healthiest and most efficient meats to consume.

4-H MARKET BROILER PROJECT

THINK ABOUT IT

Though it's not quite time to purchase market broilers for county show just yet. If you are new to the project and you're considering it, you need to get started on housing for your birds now. Market broilers respond best to a controlled environment that can be heated and cooled. They should not be kept with your backyard laying hens. Below are some things to keep in mind for market broiler housing.

Information compiled using the <u>Texas 4-H Poultry Explorer Guide</u>

Housing

Housing Structure The most ideal structure for housing your chickens is one that can be fully enclosed so that it can protect your chickens from any dramatic changes in temperature, but can also allow natural light and air in. You can easily set up a pen in a barn, garage, or workshop as long as you have the ability to regulate temperature along with ventilation. A good rule of thumb is to provide at least two square feet of floor space per chick. An existing storage shed can make a great place to house your birds. Bedding:

By selecting the right bedding for your birds, you can ensure that they are raised in a healthy, clean environment which will have a positive impact on their growth performance. Before you bring your birds home, make sure to set up their pen. The bedding will provide your chicks warmth, as well as cushion, for their feet and breast when they lay down. A few examples of good bedding for your poultry project are: rice hulls, wood shavings, or coarse, dry sawdust.

Make sure to lay down at least 4 inches of bedding on the floor of your chick's pen. It is essential to make sure the bedding is kept dry by cleaning out the pen on a regular basis. Wet bedding can harbor diseases and can cause respiratory problems in your birds. A good way to determine if the bedding is too wet is by grabbing a handful of bedding and squeezing it together. If it sticks, it is too wet and you need to replace it with dry, clean bedding.

Temperature Control:

Just like other animals, poultry have a thermoneutral zone, which is when the temperature feels just right to them. If the temperature is above their thermoneutral zone, then the birds are susceptible to heat stress, whereas if the temperature is below, the birds will use more of their energy in order to stay warm.

Using fans in your poultry house can assist in keeping your birds cool during the hot months. The best type of fan system would be to use fans that are controlled by timers or thermostats. It is important to remember that you need to allow fresh air to enter the poultry house through doors or windows. If you don't have the ability to install fans with timers, stir fans can be setup in the house to help cool off your birds. The fans need to be placed 2 to 3 feet off the ground which will allow for the cool air to blow across the birds.

Air conditioners can be useful (and honestly are necessary for a county show our time of year) in your poultry house during the warmer months. You must be careful when using air conditioners because your birds can get acclimated to the cooler climate, then can become heat stressed when you take them to a show where they will be housed in a non-air-conditioned environment. It is important to note that excessive heat stress can kill your birds, so you need to keep this in mind when setting up your ventilation system in your poultry house.

Lighting:

By providing 24 hours of natural or artificial light to your poultry project, you can help improve their feathering along with their weight gain. After you remove the heat lamps, you can hang a 40-watt bulb 6 feet above the birds to provide them with artificial light.

What is Ag Engineering

Agricultural Engineering is a field of engineering that focuses on the design, development, and improvement of agricultural machinery, equipment, and technology to increase a farm's productivity. Their main objective is to make farms more sustainable and eco-friendly. They evaluate and solve problems such as pollution control, management of natural resources, sustainable agriculture, the environmental impact of intensive agriculture, and how farms manage agricultural products after harvest.

Agricultural Engineering typically focuses on the design and construction of agricultural land and agricultural equipment, but may also be involved in the development and construction of other types of agricultural infrastructure, such as warehouses, water storage tanks, and dams. It is a multidisciplinary field of engineering that integrates new technology, such as artificial intelligence, with agricultural principles. It combines mechanical engineering, civil engineering, electrical engineering, and chemical engineering. In this industry there are BOTH degreed and technical educational pathways.
