A Word from Kayla

Parents this one is for you!

Don't always bail your kid(s) out, failure is necessary to learn...

This is strictly my opinion and observations based off of being a County Extension Agent for 16 years, so take it or leave it. Oh, and if I try to bail Thax out, or being a snow plow or helicopter parent, be sure to shove this article in my face and say...you said!

My 6th grade year was the first year Humanities classes (now known as AP classes), made their appearance in Sweetwater ISD. I had been an A's-R-Us student every six weeks of my entire school career. Anything less than an A was not acceptable in my dad's eyes. Anyhow, 17 students were selected to be in the first Humanities English and Social Studies class, an I was one of the students selected. The first six weeks I went from an "A" student to making a "C".; I was devastated. My mom even agreed that it was best that we not tell my dad (side note...he ended up finding out anyways). I talked to my teacher the day after my career ending "All A's" streak and she said something that has stuck with me to this day. She told me that the real results happen when I take that C, learn from it, and turn it back into an A. You see, I earned that C. It wasn't the teacher's fault, I didn't put the time and effort in required for that course and I got what I deserved. I took her challenge and the very next 6 weeks worked my rear end off to earn the A.

A several years ago, I had taken a day off during the week to get some yard work done, and while on the mower I had a parent call my cell phone to let me know they had missed the entry deadline for a major stock show and in no way did they want us to jump through hoops to try to get the entry submitted. The parent explained that they had given the entry responsibility to their 4-H'er to handle, had reminded them, and when the 4-H'er did not get it submitted, well that was on the young person, not our responsibility to try to fix. You know what...that 4-H'er never missed another deadline.

I think sometimes we get so caught up with being so involved in everything that we forget who's responsibility it really is. I've been just as guilty as an Agent; doing something for a 4-H'er, that in reality, the 4-H'er should've been doing themselves. <u>We are not doing them any favors by doing the things they should be doing for them!!</u> Parents, I'm giving you permission to let your kids fail at something especially if you've already reminded them or they know it's their responsibility. Why? you ask. <u>Because you've already reminded them and they know it's their responsibility.</u> Don't let them play you, these kiddos are smart.

Remember...

- Poor planning on their part, does not constitute an emergency on your part. My momma was good at using this one. We lived about 20 miles out of town so if I forgot something, too bad, she wasn't driving back to town to get it.
- If no one is going to die as a result of them failing, let them fail, and learn from their mistakes. Yes, they may be disappointed, and yes they may have really messed up on something really important, but if we are always there to bail them out in the high stakes times...when are they ever going to learn?
- I have had to be the bad guy on several occasions, and you know what? They usually get over it. I have "devastated" and "disappointed" more kid's than I'd like to count, but I can't tell you one relationship that has ended over it. More often than not, they come back and thank me for showing them tough love.

1 24-25 **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors must meet certain requirements to be considered for selection as an Ambassador. The requirements are as follows:

- Be in at least the 9th grade at beginning of the 2024-2025 school year
- Submit completed application online by April 1, 2024
- Applicants do not have to be a current member of Texas 4-H, but must agree to become a 4-H member
 (\$25 annual membership fee due September 1, 2024) if selected to participate in the HTYA program

1 24-25 MEMBER REQUIREMENTS

Those selected as a *Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador* must fulfill the following obligations. Failure to do so may result in dismissal from the program.

- Attend the statewide Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador Summit. All fees related to this training will be the responsibility of the Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador and/or county program.
- Must be a member in good standing with any other state ambassador programs where membership is held.
- Complete and report 40 hours of leadership, program efforts, or community service annually.
- Attend required continuing education trainings offered face-to-face and/or online.
- Ambassadorship is a 12-month commitment, beginning in June. Ambassadors who fulfill the minimum (40) hours of service will be invited to reapply for the following year.
- Organize at least one community health event during the year with the local Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador team and County Extension Agent.

■ 24-25 ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors must make every effort possible to attend all activities and meetings. If attendance is not possible, notice must be given to the County Extension Agent in charge, in advance, at which time agent(s) will determine if it is an excused absence.

■ 24-25 STATEWIDE SUMMIT

Attendance at the *Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador* summit **is not** optional. *No virtual or alternative options offered.*

Join us Sunday and Monday before Texas 4-H State Roundup in College Station for the 2024 Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador summit.

Registration will open in May 2024 for all accepted ambassadors. Youth ambassadors will be responsible for their own lodging.






Do you like to shop?


This section will have practice consumer decision making classes and reasons examples to help you prepare for the District 3 4-H Consumer contest in the spring.








TEXAS 4-H DOG SHOW CLASSES AT A GLANCE

Note: The 2023-2024 Texas 4-H Dog Show Rules have not yet been released. The information below is based off of the 22-23 Rules and is subject to change.



- . The Canine Good Citizen testing is a non-competitive opportunity for exhibitors to demonstrate their dog's basic good manners and earn the Canine Good Citizenship certificate through AKC. Started in 1989, the CGC Program is designed to reward dogs who have good manners at home and in the community. The CGC Program is a program that stresses responsible pet ownership for owners and basic good manners for dogs. All dogs who pass the 10-step CGC test may receive a certificate from the American Kennel Club. Testing is subject to certified judge availability.
- The 10 Steps are...
 - 1. Accepting a friendly stranger
 - 2. Sitting politely for petting
 - 3. Appearance and grooming
 - Out for a walk (walking on a loose lead)
 - 5. Walking through a crowd
 - Sit and sown on command and staying in place
 - 7. Coming when called
 - 8. Reaction to another dog
 - 9. Reaction to distraction
 - 10. Supervised separation



TEXAS 4-H DOG SHOW CLASSES

Photography

A detailed description of categories, size requirements and the photo submission process will of course be included in the 23-24 Rule Book.

- · Dog Still Life
- · Dog Active
- · Storyboard
- Theme
- Funny Dog

Costume

Divided into age divisions - Junior, Intermediate and Senior. Judged on...

- Creativity produce or create (not purchase) something unique, new and original.
- Showmanship Personality, poise, confidence, expression and stage presence.
- · Costuming Appropriate for age and youth audience.
- Material Chosen Appropriate for audience and the ability of the performer.
- Audience Appeal Evokes reaction from audience that is desired from the performance.

Conformation

- · Dog is judged on breed standards
- · Shown in group classes
- · Purebred dogs do not have to be registered
- · Non-purebred dogs will be shown by weight

Showmanship

- · Exhibitor is judged on ability to handle a dog
- · Patterns may be directed
- Exhibitors may be asked questions regarding: dog anatomy, breeds, health and nutrition and 4-H trivia (resources found on Texas 4-H Dog Project page)
- · Broken into age divisions and skill levels

TEXAS 4-H DOG SHOW CLASSES CONTINUED

Rally

- · A series of signs give instructions for exhibitor to follow
- · More relaxed than obedience
- · May give hand and voice commands
- · Broken into skill level and age division

Obedience

- A series of commands (signs or verbal, depending on level of experience) will provide direction to exhibitor
- Must choose between had or voice commands, cannot use both
- · Broken into skill level and age division

Drill

- · Dog/Handler teams choreographed to music
- · Exhibit obedience commands
- · 5 minute routine

Freestyle Drill

- · Props are allowed
- · 1-3 or 4 or more members

Traditional Drill

- No props
- · Minimum 3 members

Tricks

- · Set list of tricks and point values
- · Exhibitors handle dogs through 4 tricks from the list

Dog Skill-a-thon


Consists of a series of stations that are designed to test the exhibitor's dog science knowledge and skills.

- · Individual contest
- · Age divisions
- · Don't have to show a dog to compete
- Stations formatted as matching, multiple choice, short answer etc.
- · Topics include but not limited to:
 - o animal behavior, care, safety and restraint
 - health and disease
 - o anatomy, physiology and conformation
 - · breed id
 - o famous dogs/working dogs/dog sports
 - · nutrition and feeding
 - housing, facilities and training
 - genetics, reproduction and management of breeding animals

mportant Info TEXAS 4-H HORSE SHOW RULES AND GUIDELINES

- Rule changes include:
- Mules and Donkeys are no longer prohibited from participating in the show
- Dogs will not be allowed on the show grounds for the safety of exhibitors
- White or buff colored shirts are no longer a requirement in Stock Horse Horsemanship or Stock Horse Showmanship
- Exhibitors are no longer limited to two horses (one mare and one gelding) in the halter division. An exhibitor can now show a mare in the 5 and over class and another mare in the 4 and under class. Exhibitors are still limited to one entry for each class.
- Motorized vehicles will be allowed on the show grounds with restrictions (see rules for restrictions)
- There are also several other minor rule revisions which are listed in red text in the rule book. Also, due to the growth of the State 4-H Horse Show, it has become necessary for us to extend our schedule by one day. We are currently working to revise the schedule of classes accordingly and will have that available on the website by the end of the month.

Validation Information (in order to show in the Parker Co. 4-H Horse Show the horse(s) must be validated by April 1st) -

- ALL horses must be validated/re-validated each year. There is no limit to the number of horses that can be validated. You are encouraged to validate all horses that may possibly be shown at district and/or state shows. Only state validated horses can be substituted in the event that a validated horse becomes unusable due to lameness, sickness, etc.
- The family can submit payment of \$10.00 per horse (\$20.00 after April 15th, or \$250 from May 1st to May 5th), in the form of a credit card ONLY.
 - From March 1 April 15, the validation cost for each horse is \$10.00. The \$10.00 cost is only guaranteed if the animal validation is approved by the county office by the April 15th deadline and the payment is processed.
 - From April 16 May 1, the validation cost for each horse is \$20.00. The \$20.00 cost is only guaranteed if the animal validation is approved by the county office by the May 1st deadline and the payment is processed.
- · Each validation must include front view, right side view, and left side view images. The entire horse should be included in the photo and markings should be clearly visible.
- If the horse is registered, a copy of the registration papers must be uploaded. These papers must list the 4-Her, sibling, parent, stepparent, grandparent or legal guardian as the current owner. If the ownership is in the process of being transferred, please list "pending" in the registration number area. Once the updated registration papers have been received, please email me a copy of the new papers and I will add it to the validation online.
- Lease horses are eligible to be validated and shown at District and State 4-H Horse Shows. An official Texas 4-H Horse Lease Agreement must be signed by the exhibitor, horse owner, and the supervising County Extension Agent. The lease period must include, at minimum, May 1st to August 31st of the current 4-H year. The lease agreement form can be found at https://texasyouthlivestock.com/horse-validation/ and must be uploaded in 4-H Online at the time of validation.
- Image uploads in 4-H Online must be in the form of a .jpg, .gif or .png file.
- Families should validate each horse only one time. Once the horse is validated, any sibling within that family in 4-H Online is eligible to show the horse at their district show and/or the State 4-H Horse Show.
- Youth validating a futurity horse must be at least 12 years of age (as of Sept. 1, 2023) and at least in the 6th grade.

 - We will begin to review validations at the state level on March 1st and will be working closely with families and agents to fix errors as quickly as possible prior to the validation deadline.

Breed Spotlight: Thrianta Rabbits

A brilliant orange-red rabbit from nose to tail describes the Thrianta. In 2005 the Thrianta became the first new breed passed by the ARBA Standards Committee since 1988 under the leadership of Hall of Fame legend Glen Carr. The breed was originally developed in Sweden for the Royal House of Orange-Nassau in the late 1930s and today this "fire of the fancy" enjoys a steady following of dedicated breeders. The Maximum weight is 6 lbs.

Market Rabbit: Recipe for Grilled Teriyaki Rabbit

Combine 1/2 cup of soy sauce, 1 tbsp sake, 3 tbsp sugar, 1 tbsp fresh ginger, and 1 clove of garlic to make a marinade.

-Marinate your rabbit overnight.

-Grill or smoke to your preference.

-Serve with vegetables and rice or noodles. Enjoy!

GROOMING:

Rabbits are constantly shedding. During the year, your bunny will go through light and heavy shedding periods. If you don't groom him, they will groom themselves, ingesting the fur, which often leads to hairballs or intestinal obstructions and a visit to the veterinarian. Always provide your bunny with plenty of fresh timothy and oat hay, changed daily, to help keep their system clear of hair build-up. Some rabbits tend to shed their old coat rapidly in just a few days instead of gradually. For these rabbits, you'll need to not only comb or brush but gently remove the huge clumps of loose fur. Be especially attentive during the summer months; the more you brush them and remove the old loose coat, the cooler they will be.

What is a Solar Eclipse?

A solar eclipse occurs when the moon is positioned between Earth and the sun and casts a shadow over Earth. Solar eclipses only occur during a new moon phase, usually about twice a year, when the moon aligns itself in such a way that it eclipses the sun, according to NASA.

Approximately twice a year we experience an eclipse season. This is when the new moon aligns itself in such a way that it eclipses the sun. Solar eclipses do not occur every time there is a new moon phase because the moon's orbit is tilted about 5 degrees relative to Earth's orbit around the sun. For this reason, the moon's shadow usually passes either above or below Earth. There are four different types of solar eclipses depending on how the sun, moon, and Earth are aligned at the time of the event:

- Total solar eclipse: The sun is fully obscured by the moon.
- Partial solar eclipse: The moon doesn't fully block the sun so only a portion of the sun is obscured.
 Here the moon appears to take a "bite" out of the sun.
- Annular solar eclipse: The moon is centered in front of the sun but doesn't cover the entirety of the surface (as seen in a total solar eclipse). A "ring of fire" shines around the moon.
- <u>Hybrid solar eclipse</u>: The rarest solar eclipse is a combination of a total and annular eclipse (sometimes known as an A-T eclipse) and is produced when the moon's shadow moves across Earth. These begin as one type of eclipse and transition to another.


Texas Eclipse Info

The 2024 Solar Eclipse will be visible in Fort Worth, TX beginning at 1:40 PM CDT on April 8, 2024, for approximately 2:33 minutes.

- Glasses are available at the 4-H Office while supplies last.
- View the Sun through eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer during the partial eclipse phases before and after totality.
- You can view the eclipse directly without proper eye
 protection only when the Moon completely obscures the
 Sun's bright face during the brief and spectacular
 period known as totality. (You'll know it's safe when you
 can no longer see any part of the Sun through eclipse
 glasses or a solar viewer.)
- As soon as you see even a little bit of the bright Sun reappear after totality, immediately put your eclipse glasses back on or use a handheld solar viewer to look at the Sun.

BEST PLACES TO VIEW THE ECLIPSE

Dallas and Fort Worth are the best spots. Many places are hosting free areas to view the eclipse such as the UTA Planetarium, or the Perot Museum. Also, the Botanic Gardens and some other museums offer low-cost viewing parties.
